Charles Hall, An Arkansas Member Speaks Up

Well, I am now caught up with e-mail and have read the latest Flyer (whew). Remember to not ignore things that are continual processes. The Flyer was nice to read. I like that the clock maker is doing his thing. Those are really beautiful clocks as well as unique. You shamed me into paying my dues with that edition, as well. It appears, from the Christmas lunch picture, that the club is continuing to expand its membership. That is nice as it will provide more souls to, hopefully, take on the roles that the limited few had been doing. Church this morning was interesting. We have a diminutive lady that sits in the pew behind us. I noticed her instability as we went to the communion rail. Her cane wasn't doing the job it was supposed to do. She doesn't kneel as she has bad knees and, when I kneel, I am her height. As the communion took place, she wobbled more, and the cane fell against me. As I picked up the cane, she collapsed and I was able to hold her up. With help, we got her to the nearest pew and into a wheeled chair where one of the members, who is also a nurse, took over. 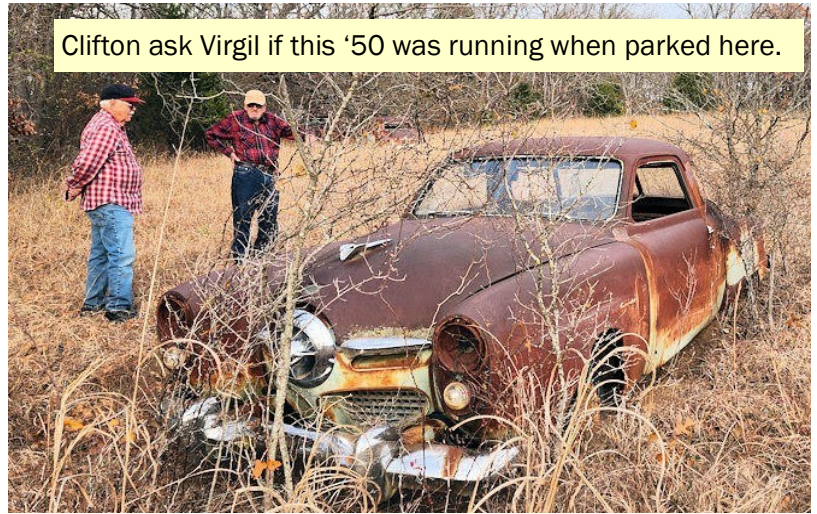

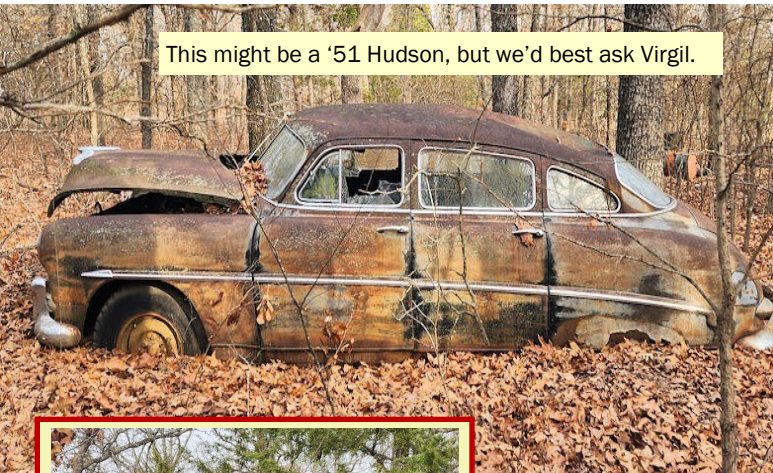

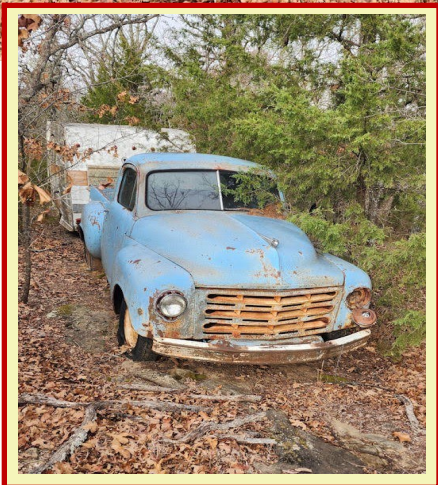
